ABOUT THE EXPO

The annual Career Expo brings opportunities directly to you - right here on campus.

As a student or recent graduate, you have the chance to meet employers from different disciplines, explore career pathways, discover new opportunities and connect directly with recruiters over two days in Bonython Hall and Hub Central.

WHY SHOULD I ATTEND?

At some point in your degree (if you have not already) you will think about your next steps... what can you do right now (gain work experience) & in the future (graduate jobs) to build your career. At Career Expo you have the opportunity to take a step in that direction. You can talk to people in your future industry, gain information about different companies and opportunities and get tips on how to apply for programs that are open now and later this year.

WHAT ARE GRADUATE AND INTERNSHIP PROGRAMS?

There are lots of phrases and words out there to describe student and graduate job opportunities - and sometimes the same phrase will mean something different at each individual company. Graduate, Internship or Vacation Programs are 'usually' structured programs offered by larger organisations where a 'bulk' or 'volume' recruitment process means several students are at the company at the same time.

INTERNSHIPS/VACATION PROGRAMS

These programs are generally offered to students in their penultimate (second to last) year of University. These programs can be offered in semester breaks and particularly over the end of year break for technical disciplines like Engineering, but can sometimes be done part time while studying. Either way, it's your chance to gain some experience within your chosen industry. Internship and Vacation programs are slightly different and some may be paid while others will be unpaid.

GRADUATE PROGRAMS

These programs are structured pathways for graduating students to enter an organisation and be guided through a development program. These programs are generally offered to students in their final year, or up to 1-2 years after graduation (sometimes more). As part of the structure you may find mentoring, buddy systems, specific training and more.

FAQs

BEFORE EXPO

Can I attend both days of Expo?

Yes you can attend both days of Career Expo - we encourage you to research all of the employers so you know who to target each day.

Do I really need to research the employers or can I just show up?

It pays to do your research. If you don't, then you end up using your time asking questions that are easily answered by their website and this can be frustrating for the employer.

To make the most of your time, employers tell us that they really value the students who have done their research and are ready for a more detailed conversation. You never know where the conversation can lead once you cut through the basics!

Really want to impress? Make sure you check out their website, social media and latest press releases before attending Expo.

With all of this and a quick "Google" - you'll really get an understanding of their workplace, values and culture.

What if an employer isn't hiring from my discipline?

It is worth asking recruiters directly about 'current recruitment' and 'future recruitment'. While they may not be hiring at the moment, there may be good opportunities coming up that they haven't advertised.

Which employers accept applications from International Students?

Each employer assesses their eligibility requirements and some employers may not be able to accept your application without permanent residency or citizenship. We encourage you to attend one of the Prepare For CareersExpo workshops to learn more, or download the CareerFair Plus+ App to filter employers who have opportunities for international students.

Why do some of these companies recruit so early for jobs that don't start until months later?

If a large company also takes on a large number of graduates each year - it takes time to recruit! This pushes the timeline back and it means starting this early. The benefit if you get through on of these 'volume recruitment' programs is that you usually go into your last semester of University knowing you have a graduate job secured - handy!

Should I go by myself or bring a friend?

This is up to you - but we generally recommend targeting your own list of employers even if you do attend with a friend or classmate. It is important to remember that you are there to promote yourself as a candidate and stand out to employers. If you have never been before but your friend has - tag along to listen in on their first conversation.

Should I bring my resume?

Most of these employers have an online application process - no need to bring your resume or portfolio to the event.

What should I wear?

We recommend wearing something that is neat and business-casual, such as nice jeans (no rips!) and a smart top or shirt and clean shoes. Remember that hair/makeup/teeth/clean glasses are all part of the professional 'look' as well.

DURING EXPO

What are your 'Pro Tips' for making the most of the event?

Having a game plan is helpful for when you are at the event. Have pen and paper or your app of choice ready to take notes as well as these top tips:

- Make the most of your time with each representative by having great questions prepared that you can't easily find answers to online.
- Be considerate of the other students around you and keep in mind that the event will be busy and noisy,
- Don't be afraid to approach a representative or recruiter, even if it's not an employer that you have researched in advance.

When I'm speaking to an employer, can I record them on my phone?

No, this is not appropriate as you should never record a conversation without all parties knowing this is happening. Take notes on paper or in your phone instead.

How do I start a conversation with an employer?

Simply introduce yourself, tell them what you are studying and why you are interested in their organisation. If you don't know about their organisation, ask them what type of students they are looking for and what kind of work they do.

Start with: "Hi, my name is X... I am graduating in two years with a major in Y... I would love to know more about how..."

AFTER EXPO

What should I do after the event?

After Careers Expo is an important time to soak in all of the information you've received. You may have been surprised by the different things you have learned and have a better idea of the place you are wanting to apply. Top tips include:

- Review your notes and do any further research you need to. Get ready to apply for any upcoming opportunities and attend Career Services' seminars, workshops or any support services.
- If you are wanting to meet more employers on campus, take a look at the upcoming Employer Presentations on CareerHub and frequently check as they are updated regularly.
- Read though CareerHub Resources.
- Consider applying for the Career Access Mentoring Program, Global IQ Connect, or the Adelaide Graduate Award to boost your employability.
